Institutional Framework

Sudan Electricity Holding Company (SEHC)



SEHC is a state-owned company responsible for the overall planning, development and management of the electricity sector.

Sudanese Electricity Distribution Company (SEDC)



SEDC is responsible for electricity distribution and retail services.

Ministry of Energy and Petroleum



The Ministry is in charge of formulating policies and setting the strategic direction for the energy and extractive sector in Sudan.

Sudanese Hydroelectric

Hydroelectric Generation Company



SHGC is a state-owned company responsible for hydroelectric power generation.

The National Electricity Corporation of Sudan (NEC)



NEC is a state-owned corporation under the Ministry of Energy and Mining. NEC is responsible for electricity generation, transmission, and distribution in Sudan.

Sudanese Thermal Power Generating Company (STPGC)



STPGC is a state-owned company responsible for thermal power generation.

Sudanese Election (SETCO)

Electricity Transmission Company



SETCO is responsible for the transmission of electricity in Sudan.

Sudanese Nuclear Energy Authority (SNEA)



SNEA is the regulatory body responsible for the development and regulation of nuclear energy in Sudan.

Electricity Regulation and Control Authority (ERCA)



The ERCA is established under the Electricity Act, 2001 and is responsible for regulation of the electricity market by granting licenses

Power Purchase Agreements (PPAs)

- As far as we are aware, there are currently no private power producers in Sudan; hence no PPAs.
- The law provides for the conclusion of PPAs in Sudan vide the newly introduced Public Private

Partnership Act 2021, which was passed with the aim of encouraging private participation in developing Sudan's infrastructure, including the power sector.

Local Shareholding Requirements

 There are generally no local shareholding restrictions for companies developing power projects in Sudan.

Credit Enhancements and Security Arrangements

 A sovereign guarantee may be granted subject to negotiations between the IPP and the offtaker.

Key Approvals/Licenses Required to be Procured

- Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) License issued under the Environmental Protection Policy Act.
- A license issued by the National Authority for Investment

Governing Law and Dispute Resolution

- Under the National Investment Encouragement Act 2013, a dispute arising from investment shall be referred to a specialized court unless the parties agree to refer it to arbitration or reconciliation, except disputes governed by one of the following treaties to which Sudan is a signatory, namely: (i) the Unified Agreement for the Investment of Arab Capital in Arab States 1980; (ii) the Agreement for Settlements of Investment Disputes among Arab States 1974; (iii) the Agreement for Settlement of Investment Disputes between States and Nationals of other States 1965; (iv) the General Agreement for Economic, Technical and Commercial Co-
- operation among Member Sates of Islamic Conference 1977.
- The Republic of Sudan is a party to the Convention on the Settlement of Investment Disputes between States and Nationals of other States, 1965 (ICSID Convention) and the Convention on the Recognition and Enforcement of Foreign Arbitral Awards, 1958 (New York Convention). Arbitral awards obtained under the ICSID Convention may face annulment, but do not require registration to be enforceable. All other awards will be enforceable under the New York Convention upon registration with the High Court.






